### Gunton Wood

As usual the last two months have been very busy, so we are particularly pleased to welcome 3 new members - Peter and Marion Smith and Colin Tyler.



We have had quite a lot of storm damage so much tidying up of fallen branches and dead trees has been needed. Some of them have been used to replace rotten path edging and some for repairs to the fencing around the pond. We have to try and stop dogs from getting into the pond, because in the past we have had problems with their claws damaging the liner and causing leaks. We also had a problem with the pond for a few weeks when there appeared to be no life in it. However, over the last couple of weeks the schoolchildren have been pond dipping and have reported quite a lot of life in there now.

Some of the ladies have been very busy in "Wally's B&B" (the bee & butterfly area). Most of the wildflowers have now been transplanted from the nursery and have been marked with canes and, in some cases, protected with shields. The grass does seem to be taking over, but we are trying to clear areas around the new flowers and also the trees that have been planted. There is a lovely show of orchids at the moment, both in the bee & butterfly area and in the wildflower meadow. The foxgloves near the pond have also been lovely, although they are dying off a bit now. The bluebells gave a good display again and some of us spent one or two Thursdays pulling up Spanish bluebells to try and stop them taking over. We do seem to be keeping them under control. A team have also been trying to pull up the docks that are threatening to take over the wild flower meadow, but it is just a question of doing the best we can, because they are very insistent !



A team of men have spent some time clearing the railway path, using the motorised hedge trimmer and the lawnmower. The pathway is quite wide and clear now and all that remains to be done is to keep the overhanging branches under control. Some of the men have also done a really good job of building and painting the new fence around the nursery. The old one was falling down and has been replaced with picket fencing kindly donated by two of our workers, Janet & Mike. Some fencing is left over and might be used to repair the fence between Church Wood and the burial ground.



The warm weather has encouraged everything to grow rapidly, so we have been busy keeping the path edges clear. We started off using scythes, but decided that they were too destructive and indiscriminate, so have now reverted to pulling nettles, clipping brambles and lopping overhanging branches. Hopefully this way we will preserve the other flowers and plants along the edges.

We have recently had two very welcome visitors to the woods. Barbara Colman joined us for a Thursday morning work party the day before the group went off to Kent. Barbara had booked to go on the trip, so came up a day early in order to join us in the wood. It was good to see her and hear all about her new home in Devon. We didn't miss the opportunity to get her working, particularly at coffee time when, after her familiar "COFFFEEEE" call, we asked her to pass the cakes around. David had provided the cakes for his impending birthday and he treated us to a short cabaret act to celebrate ! Our other visit was from June Sedgeley, one of the founding members of GWCP, who came along to celebrate her 90th birthday. Unfortunately, June is not able to join us on Thursdays anymore, but for this special occasion, David went to

collect her and brought her down for coffee in her wheelchair and she brought along a lovely chocolate cake for us to share. It was a real treat to see June out in the wood again and she thoroughly enjoyed seeing everyone and having a chat.
