#### Springtime in Gunton Wood

This has to be the best time of the year as the wood comes back to life with new growth, swathes of flowers and continuous birdsong. The snowdrops were late this year and the aconites even later; so much so that we began to think they had been stolen.







But eventually they showed and, after a flurry of February snow, the ladies got busy dividing and replanting. Then it was the turn of the daffodils and primroses followed by cowslips on the wild flower meadow. Once again, Moore's Lane is a mass of flowers and, judging by the foliage, the bluebell display in Church Wood is spreading to cover most of the rest of the wood. Lack of rain for the young trees was

a problem but April brought life-saving showers which subsequently turned into continuous downpours.

Another grateful recipient of the rain was, of course, the pond and we were delighted to see large quantities of frog spawn, a sure sign of good health. The combination of rain and strong winds in early March brought down several trees, including this goat willow in Moore's Lane, providing proof of the need to try to limit the size of these trees because of their shallow root systems.





In February it was bird box time again and Colin Giddins again took on the lion's share of the work, helped by Ken, Richard and the two Davids..

The remains of last year's nests were found in 37 boxes, an all-time record. Nine boxes needed replacing and many others were repaired but it wasn't long before our "friendly" woodpecker resumed his attacks....

The nest building and egg laying timetable has been upset this year by the weather as a cold and wet April has followed a warm, sunny March. You could almost

see the tits scratching their heads, wondering what to do .....

#### Nature Reserve

Perseverance has paid off and the top pond has been virtually cleared of its invasive bur weed. The lower pond, too, is looking very healthy following the removal of the last pieces of debris. This pond remains completely clear of duckweed, an unexplained phenomenem. A lot of effort has been put into clearing fallen trees from the ditches bordering the Reserve.

Unfortunately, some dog walkers do not seem to think it necessary to pick up after their animals and, together with the inevitable litter blowing in from the Filling Station, this can spoil the experience of walking through a very attractive area of natural woodland.

Another matter of concern during the Easter School holidays was the stupidity of youngsters who lit a large fire while camping in the Reserve. This could easily have spread causing a great deal of damage and the Police have been informed of the situation.

#### Foxburrow Wood

The work programme under Suffolk Foundation's "Grassroots" scheme has been completed with the installation of a kissing gate and steps at the Northern entrance to the wood. Well done to everybody involved in making this fascinating piece of Ancient Woodland more accessible to the public.

#### **Work Parties**

Work parties continue to be well supported and every Thursday morning at 9 o'clock 25 or more volunteers gather at the tool shed. Usually the weather is kind and everyone is anxious to get started. But it is no easy matter to distribute jobs quickly to so many people, although we are getting better. We divide into groups, one fencing, another chipping, another doing essential tree work, another weeding and so on.. All too soon it is 10.30 am and we start to smell the coffee and taste the cakes .... it is nearly always somebody's birthday. David usually has a few words to say about forthcoming events and then it's time to put the tools away and go home. It's a great way to take a little exercise in the "Green Gym", to keep up friendships and we would all be lost without our Thursday morning "fix".

# 15<sup>th</sup> A G M

Fine weather helped to secure a strong turnout for the Annual General Meeting held at Gunton CP School on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2012. All 3 Gunton Councillors, Matt Gooch (SWT) and Harry Hill (PCC) plus 67 members attended. Barry Shimmield opened the meeting with a summary of the Minutes of the previous year's AGM, followed by a report on the year's activities which could be summarised as "steady progress across the board". Membership continues to grow, the Group's financial assets increased by an additional £600, mainly due to generous donations, and all the social events were fully subscribed. Highlights of the past year were the 1000<sup>th</sup> Work Party in June, the adoption of chainsaw operations funded by a Lottery Grant, many improvements to the Nature Reserve, successful school visits including lots of pond dipping and Group outings to Hyde Hall, the South Coast, Gressenhall and Snape. Both the Chairman and the Secretary thanked the Committee and Work Party volunteers for their unstinting help in the continuing success of the Group which is highly respected in the community.

Our guest speaker, Mr Colin Challis, led us through the fascinating history of Lowestoft Porcelain from its 18<sup>th</sup> Century origins in Gunton Wood until the demise of the Lowestoft factory in Crown Street. After showing samples of a modern version of the ware, for which he is responsible as Chief Artist, the Chairman thanked him for a most interesting talk enlivened with many anecdotes.

The Committee was re-elected with one change; Chris Chapman replaced Brian Channing who is standing down after serving for 14 years, for which he received gratitude and warm thanks from everyone present.

After discussing next year's work programme, including a contribution from Matt Gooch on the Nature Reserve, Harry Hill from Gunton St Peters PCC gave an update of the Church Field Memorial Wood project following which he answered questions from the floor.

The Chairman summarised the full list of Social Events planned for the year and then took some AOB items. A vote of thanks for the Committee's work over the year was proposed by Mike Field and the Chairman then closed the meeting.



#### Christmas Spectacular at Snape Maltings

It seems a long time ago now but just before Christmas the Group enjoyed its customary outing to Snape to watch the Co-Op Juniors perform their amazing music and dance extravaganza. #### **Planning**


A few weeks ago the Department for Communities and Local Government produced their **Revised National Planning Policy Framework.** This followed widespread criticism of the earlier draft document to which we also voiced our comments. The new NPPF is definitely an improvement with more safeguards in place for our precious Strategic Gaps and Open Spaces. But, as always, the devil is in the detail and we must remain vigilant to see how the new rules are implemented in practice. It does seem rather surprising that such a far reaching change in Planning legislation does not get debated and voted on in Parliament .... but that is the situation and the NPPF is now law.

#### **Litter Pick**

This year we brought forward the date of the joint GWCP / GPRA litter pick by a few weeks to avoid the rubbish becoming masked by undergrowth. There was an excellent turnout of 40 volunteers and in a couple of hours nearly 60 bags of litter were recovered which, in many ways, is a sad reflection on the way our green spaces are being treated by some members of the community.



Tesco were very co-operative by providing hot-cross buns and other items while Waveney Norse helped by lending us litter pickers and by organising the removal of the mountain of rubbish.

#### Nature Notes Alexanders Smyrnium olustratum

When does a wildflower become a *thug?* Take Alexanders for example. They used to be confined to a narrow strip around the coast of Britain, but now they populate every verge and roadside smothering other wild flowers. (This may be the result of salt gritting in Winter). So GWCP is conducting a cull. The entire plant is said to be edible but many people find them overpowering. Here is a recipe where the taste remains as a gentle background.....

You need 60 mussels, 1 onion, 30g finely chopped leaves of Alexanders, 60g butter, 60 ml parsnip wine and black pepper. Put mussels in large saucepan with onion and

half the Alexanders. Add parsnip wine and heat to steam them open, discard those that don't. Pour into a colander, collecting the juices. Pour back into saucepan (leaving grit behind). Heat, whisk in the butter. Put the mussels in a big bowl, pour the juice over, add the rest of the Alexanders and few twists of black pepper.
