Gunton Wood



Resurfacing of the main path, from the gate to the coffee area, is finished and has made a big improvement to the surface. We hope everyone is enjoying not having to wade through all that mud anymore! We are very grateful to Cllr. Keith Patience who funded the project. We are now waiting for the next section, from the coffee area towards the pond, to be done sometime in March. Cllr. Janet Craig has offered to fund part of this second phase from her locality budget and with some funds left over from the first phase only £170 remained, which we were going to fund ourselves. However, Annette Robinson from Suffolk Council has offered to cover the shortfall from her Rights of Way budget. Many thanks to everyone who has given their support. All the work has been carried out by Alan Nobbs Surfacing Contractors from Ditchingham and we are very pleased with the result.

The Saturday gang have finished all the work identified in the annual tree inspection for GWCP to undertake. The resulting logs have been used for path edging, replacing rotten seats at the coffee area and repairing the fence around the pond. There are still some large trees that need to be taken down, which are too big for us to handle. Waveney Norse will take care of those at some stage. Three dead elms that had fallen across the ditch in high winds have also been removed.

The annual bird box clean and survey has been completed. 26 boxes had been used for nesting and 16 had signs of “overwintering”. Some of the boxes had been attacked by woodpeckers so they have been reinforced with metal plates. Some needed more general repairs and three had to be replaced. Records about the bird boxes have been kept since 2003 and show that the number of nests has ranged from 22 (2011) at the lowest to 37 (2012) at the highest. This year’s figure is a little bit low, but probably not anything to be concerned about.

There has been a shortage of chippings since before Christmas, which means we’ve only had 2 or 3 Thursdays when we’ve been able to chip any paths. However, this does mean we’ve been able to access the old chippings/compost at the bottom of the heaps, which we have used as mulch around recently planted trees.

We were all intrigued and quite excited when, at the last work party in February, Paul Domaingue brought along a photo of an otter in one of the gardens in Crome Walk. Unfortunately most of the fish in the garden pond had been eaten, so Paul suggested anyone with a pond should make sure it is well protected. The otter trust were contacted and said that otters can travel 20 to 40 kilometres away from swollen or flooded rivers, to scavenge. We have since heard that there are otters in the Gunton Hall lake, so it might be worth wandering down there to see if you can spot one!



Foxburrow Wood

The Saturday gang have done a really good job of repairing the kissing gate and notice board at the Gainsborough Drive entrance.

On Feb. 11th the Thursday work party moved to Foxburrow, where we removed bracken and brambles from the bluebell area. This is a job we have done for a few years and this year there was not so much to remove, so it seems to be paying off. We all enjoyed working together for a change and with not so much to do we took the chance to have a chat and catch up with each other.

Nature Reserve - Ray Adcock, SWT Warden

“From September to the end of the year we carried out our usual clean-up of the reserve and the open areas were cut and the grass cleared. We then set about the major task of clearing the brambles, etc from in front of the hedge along Leisure Way. It took several work parties to clear this area which then allowed Matt and his team to cut back part of the hedge to reduce the height of the trees and to hopefully thicken growth within the hedge. This hedge had not had any work done on it since it was planted many years ago. I think that this was a job well worth doing as it cleared all the litter that was thrown into the hedge (and there were many, many bags of litter) and it does make the area look as though it is being cared for. It does not, however, stop litter being dumped but it does make it easier to clear up the blue gloves and paper towels from the Filling Station which during these last few weeks have been a terrible problem. Tesco has been asked to do something about the litter that they are creating.

We have recently planted several hawthorns and field maples in areas where trees had died.”

Nature Notes

The Call of the Great Tit (with acknowledgements to David Attenborough's tweet-of-the-day).

Perhaps the commonest bird song heard in Gunton Wood is the persistent metallic 'teacher-teacher' call of the Great Tit. But this is just one of the 40 or more calls associated with this species and every bird has a repertoire of at least 10 calls. Why so many? It is the Beau Geste syndrome. In the famous French Foreign Legion story, Beau Geste made a valiant attempt to defend the fort against attacking Tauregs by propping up corpses to make it look as though many soldiers were left. Similarly our feathered friend mimics the calls of many birds to give the impression that his territory is well defended... très ingénieux!
